Dear David:

This letter follows up on the four outstanding items you identified by email after our last meet-and-confer.

Rich declaration

Enclosed is a revised draft Rich declaration. As discussed, it adds information about the predecessor to form DHS-191 in paragraph 7.

Regarding your request for more detail about how CBP prepared the accounting of disclosures when they were required under the Privacy Act (your "Juanita Jones" example), that request is beyond the scope of what the agency is required to do. The agency is required to produce any responsive, non-exempt records that are located after a reasonable search. Rich explained in her declaration that she searched and there was no TECS person subject record for plaintiff. The agency is not required to provide the requested additional information involving hypothetical people, which is beyond the scope of plaintiff's requests and this litigation.

Further ATS records

Enclosed are further ATS records (not Bates numbered) with third-party names redacted, which were generated from the ATS PNR searches for HASBR! and for plaintiff's passport number.

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Non-PNR ATS data under FOIA

We have reviewed the pages you cited in the summary judgment briefing, which make clear that plaintiff never raised this as a FOIA issue but purely as a Privacy Act issue. See Pl.'s MSJ at 20 (raising the issue in the context of the Privacy Branch search and citing to Ex. C, which references plaintiff's "Privacy Act request" "for all of his records contained in the ATS system of records"). Plaintiff stated numerous times in his summary judgment brief and declaration that his requests for ATS records were Privacy Act requests. See id. at 2-3 (describing 2007 Privacy Act request and appeal for ATS records); id. at 4-5 (describing 2009 Privacy Act request for ATS and other records); Hasbrouck Decl. ¶¶ 3, 6, 7, 20, 25, 28. Plaintiff specifically stated in his summary judgment motion that his only FOIA challenge was to "CBP's withholding the entirety of the ATS and TECS user guides under exemption (7)(E) of FOIA." Pl.'s MSJ at 10:22-23.


Similarly, plaintiff stated repeatedly in his correspondence and communications with the agency that his requests for ATS records were made under the Privacy Act. See id., Ex. A (plaintiff's request dated June 22, 2007, styled as a "Privacy Act Request" and stating, "This letter constitutes a request under the Privacy Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552a."); Def.'s MSJ, Ex. E (plaintiff's request dated October 15, 2009, styled as a "Privacy Act Request" and stating, "This letter constitutes a request under the Privacy Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552a."); Suzuki Decl. ¶ 11 ("Plaintiff insisted that his September 13, 2007 appeal be treated as a Privacy Act Appeal. Accordingly, the appeal was transferred to the Privacy Act Policy & Procedures Branch."); Castelli Decl. ¶ 10 (stating that Castelli confirmed "Plaintiff's intention that it be processed under the Privacy Act, rather than the FOIA").

Plaintiff's attempt to obtain ATS information under FOIA at this late stage is therefore improper.

DECLARATION OF MARIA RICH

I, Maria Rich, hereby declare and state as follows:

1. I am the Deputy Executive Director, Passenger Systems Program Office, Office of Information and Technology, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (“CBP”), within the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (“DHS”) and I have held this position since February 2009. I initially worked for CBP (formerly the U.S. Customs Service) as a contractor for twenty years working on TECS related projects starting in 1984. I have been working with CBP as a federal employee since January 2007. I was hired and assigned to Passenger Systems Program Office, where I remain to this day. During the course of these assignments, I became recognized as an expert on TECS, a law enforcement information system, and attained a working knowledge of the Advance Passenger Information System (APIS) and the Border Crossing Information (BCI) applications. I make this declaration based on my personal knowledge and information I have received in the performance of my official duties. This declaration is intended to supplement information already provided concerning audit functions of TECS and BCI and the “accounting of disclosure” to third parties as it pertains to TECS.
2. The Passenger Systems Program Office, OIT, is responsible for TECS, APIS and BCI systems. Border Crossing Information is stored within TECS, and was called out specifically and separately as a system of record, leading to the acronym BCIS being used in the System of Record Notice (SORN). Detailed information regarding TECS was published in the Notice of Privacy Act System of Records Notice (“SORN”) at 73 FR 77778 (Dec. 19, 2008); the regulations at 6 C.F.R. Pt. 5, App. C, par. 22; and the initial SORN for TECS located at 66 FR 52984.

3. TECS is principally owned and managed by CBP and is its principal law enforcement and anti-terrorism database system. TECS is established as an overarching law enforcement information collecting, analysis, and sharing environment that securely links telecommunications devices and personal computers to a central system and database. This environment is comprised of several modules designed to collect, maintain, and screen data as well as conduct analysis, screening, and information sharing. The TECS database contains temporary and permanent enforcement, inspection, and intelligence records relevant to the anti-terrorism and law enforcement mission of CBP and numerous other federal agencies that it supports. The purpose of the system is to track individuals who have violated or are suspected of violating a law or regulation that is enforced or administered by CBP, to provide a record of any inspections conducted at the border by CBP, to determine inadmissibility into the United States and to record information regarding individuals, firms, and organizations to whom DHS/CBP has issued detentions and warnings. The Secretary of DHS has exempted this system from the notification, access, and amendment procedures of the Privacy Act because it is a law enforcement system. 74 FR 45072 (Aug. 31, 2009). However, CBP will consider individual requests to determine whether or not information may be released. *Id.*

4. In general an “audit log” is a database table or application file that contains a journal of the application user’s data requests or queries into the related application data. Application audit logs allow System Administrators to respond to “user activity” requests from the CBP Internal Affairs Program Office. Audit logs can also be used to profile generic user behavior which can be used as a feedback loop for improving software development efforts. For TECS audit logs the application logs the users queries into a

table that contains the user ID, date and time, sometimes location and activity performed such as the data values that were being used for the query. There are audit logs generated in TECS that show when a record is created, updated and deleted. This information is stored using the record id; there are no audit logs stored by Subject Name.

5. A TECS Subject Record is a method of communicating known or potential risk(s) to TECS users. Subject Records could be created against persons, conveyances, documents, or other entities which a TECS user may query. Creating a subject informs the TECS user the nature of the interest, should the subject be encountered. This provides guidance as to how to manage/conduct the encounter. Note the encounter may be in person or when vetting or research is conducted. The nature of the interest is reflected in the Status Code chosen, as well as within the remarks displayed.
To the best of my ability, I can find no TECS Subject Record for Mr. Hasbrouck. Since there is no Subject Record, there would be no audit log of Subject Record activity in TECS.

6. Border Crossing Information (BCI) system receives and maintains border crossing information on travelers who are admitted or paroled into the United States, including certain biographical information; a photograph; certain itinerary information provided by air and sea carriers and any other forms of passenger transportation, including rail, which is or may subsequently be mandated, or is or may be provided on a voluntary basis; and the time and location of the border crossing. Detailed information regarding the BCI system can be found in the Privacy Act System of Records Notice at 73 FR 43457 (Jul. 25, 2008), the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for Privacy Act Exemption 73 FR 43374 (Jun. 25, 2008), the Final Rule for Privacy Act Exemptions 75

FR 5491 (Feb. 3, 2010), and 6 C.F.R. Pt.5, App. C, par. 46. The Secretary of DHS has exempted this system from the notification, access, and amendment procedures of the Privacy Act because it is a law enforcement system. 75 FR 5491 (Feb. 3, 2010) and 6 C.F.R. Pt.5, App. C, par. 46.

Crossing history, which makes up BCI, is available but there is no audit log of the crossing history information at this time. There is crossing history/BCI for Plaintiff, corresponding to his crossings into the United States for which his name was queried. I also have reviewed the government's filings in this litigation and I am aware that the agency has released this crossing history to Plaintiff.

7. TECS has a requirement for completion of a DHS-191 form for disclosure of information to a third party. The predecessor to the DHS-191 form was the CF-191 (Customs Form 191). TECS Person Subject Records have an automated capture of the "stub" information necessary to generate a DHS-191. This information is recorded whenever anyone views a TECS Subject Records. There is no automated DHS-191 process for any other information stored in TECS, of which I am aware. Since there is no TECS Subject Record pertaining to Plaintiff, there would have been no viewing of a Subject Record, so there would be no automatically generated "stub" DHS-191 record generated.

Larry / Kristen:

Sorry for the delay. Here is a status update on the request.

I have conducted searches of PNR records (whether from the Sabre reservation system or others) using the following criteria:

pseudo-city code = A787 AND agent sine = A24

OR

pseudo-city code = A787 AND agent sine = AEH

OR

ARC/IATA travel agency ID number = 05626515 AND agent = EH

OR

ARC/IATA travel agency ID number = 05626515 AND agent = EDWARD

The results of my searches revealed no corresponding PNR records. To be absolutely sure of locating any possibly responsive records, I have asked OIT to conduct string searches of all PNR in the database (whether from the Sabre reservation system or others) to locate the above criteria regardless of where they may be located in the PNR. The string searches are quite intensive and encompassing, and are being conducted judiciously to prevent impact on the live system; to date, they are still running and may continue to do so for some several days. I will provide updates as I receive them.

David,

Sorry for my delay in following up on Mr. Hasbrouck's appeal, I wanted to ask that you also make available any PNR records that might be responsive to Mr. Hasbrouck, as he describes below in his appeal (.pdf version attached):

B. PNRs containing data entered by, or otherwise identifiable with, Mr. Hasbrouck in his capacity as a travel agent. These include, but are not limited to, PNRs from the Sabre computerized reservation system showing PNR history entries from pseudo-city code A787 and agent sines A24 or AEH, and all records identifiable with ARC/IATA travel agency ID number 05626515 and agent "EH" or "EDWARD". (please note that Mr. Hasbrouck has requested terminal ID and date references specifically associated with his capacity as a travel agent)

C. Portions of responsive PNRs not displayed on the "face" (front page) or "history" (audit trail) of the PNR. The existence of additional categories of PNR data in ATS records is specifically confirmed both in the SORN and in the portions of PNRs disclosed in response to Mr. Hasbrouck's request,

described in lines such as "ELECTRONIC [ticket] DATA EXISTS] *HTE", "LINEAR FARE DATA EXISTS] *LF", and "VCR COUPON DATA EXISTS *VI TO DISPLAY". This data includes, but is not limited to, ticketing records (including electronic and paper ticket records), frequent flyer data, and seating records. This data typically exists buried within PNRs without explicit mention of their existence on the face of the PNR. Without access to the complete PNRs in their original electronic form, as well as the specifications for the systems in which they were created and stored and the protocols by which they were transmitted, it is impossible to know with certainty what other data might be contained in the responsive PNRs. D. Split PNRs identifiable with Mr. Hasbrouck through "SPLIT" or "DIVIDED" references in PNRs (as mentioned in the SORN and visible in the portions of PNRs disclosed to Mr. Hasbrouck), as well as any API data and any other ATS information associated with those split PNRs.

Generally, I think that MR. Hasbrouck is entitled to access to his own PNR and whatever information is contained within those records, and to information responsive to his capacity as a travel agent on other persons's PNRs, so long as we may be able to exclude access to information responsive to the other persons on those PNRs. With regard to what is specifically identified in requests C. and D., I leave it to you to explain whether or not these items are part of the PNR records that we maintain.

I have also attached copies of the current ATS SORN and PIA as these documents, and not Mr. Hasbrouck's request, should inform the extent of our obligations under the privacy act in responding to his appeal.

An asterisk in the "FOIA Exemption Cited" column of this *Vaughn* Index indicates that Exemption (b)(2) was cited as a justification for redacting information from the information released to plaintiff in 2010 but is no longer being relied upon post-*Milner*.
